

Canon Factory for a Church

Methodists should be familiar with the names John Wesley and Charles Wesley. They were the brothers from 18th Century England credited with starting the Methodist Movement. Both had heart-warming experiences in 1738. They wanted to stir up a revival in the Church of England. As in many cases, the established traditional church frowned upon any evangelistic fervor that might “change” anything. So, they banned the Wesley brothers from the Church of England’s pulpits. The religious institution was too comfortable and complacent to deal with clergy ready to win souls for Christ.

I find it ironic that John Wesley purchased an old canon factory outside of London to build a chapel. Methodism “boomed” after that! To mark the very first service in the newly built chapel on Easter Sunday in April 1739, Charles Wesley composed a hymn:

***Christ the Lord is risen today, sons of men and angels say.
Raise your joys and triumphs high, sing ye heavens and earth reply.
Love’s redeeming work is done, fought the fight the battle won;
Lo the Sun’s eclipse is o’er; Lo! He sets in blood no more!***

You’ve probably noticed that some changes have occurred since Charles Wesley’s original presentation of this Easter hymn. The last two phrases of the second verse above were changed to “Death in vain forbids Him rise, Christ has opened paradise.”

Originally it was sung to a rather slow Handel tune. Yet, there needed to be a way to capture the jubilant joy of the fact Jesus arose from the grave on Easter. So, the hymn was wed with another tune called “Lyra Davidica” (composed in 1708).

Still, Wesley’s words just didn’t fit the tune. So a creative editor decided to add the word “Alleluia” at the end of every phrase. Now, the Christian church would have an excellent Easter hymn to sing in celebration of Jesus’ resurrection!

I pray your hearts will be filled with Easter joy! A college history professor used to speak of historic events with such enthusiasm that you would think that it just happened. Christians perhaps need to display the same measure of elation that Christ is risen! Yes, Jesus has risen indeed!

When people talk about their most inspirational powerful memories of Brundidge United Methodist Church “The Last Supper” drama presentation is frequently mentioned. The original mural by Leonardi da Vinci dates to 1495. It is located on a wall in the Convent of Santa Maria delle Grazie in Milan, Italy. I, Rev Ed, had the pleasure of participating in one production since serving as your pastor (2014). Guess what part they assigned to me? Judas Iscariot. Somebody had to be Judas.



Former Pastor Jimmie Spikes (serving 1994-2001) did a fabulous work in directing the drama and building the sets. Jimmie and Freida are active members of our church. They were named “Man and Woman of the Year 1999.” In that letter of declaration it was stated:

“Jimmie and Freida Spikes, in appreciation for the many kind acts of service to this church and its membership, you have been chosen as recipients of the man and the woman of the year award for 1999. Your abundant expressions of Christian love and concern for this congregation and this community have been an inspiration to all who have been privileged to have the opportunity to know you. Jimmie, you have been an example to all of us as our minister and as our friend. Freida, you have shown us spiritual love in action as well as family and marriage values.”


