
Let us send out words of encouragement all around us like a sprinkler distributes refreshing water to a parched lawn.

Think Eternal and Tend to Your Soul.....Rev Ed

Peter Cartwright the Oldest Circuit Rider Born on September 1, 1785

No, he wasn't one of those Cartwrights on the "Bonanza" TV show. He surpassed Bishop Francis Asbury in age and years of service by an entire decade. America's Bishop Asbury died at age 71 (1745-1816) and Peter Cartwright died in the same month that he was born 87 years later on September 25th (1785-1872).

Cartwright was a rowdy youth, but his Methodist mother prayed for him. At age 16 while at a camp meeting Peter accepted Jesus as his Savior. A year later he had his own circuit. Historians described his appearance: "He was war-torn and weather beaten. His face wrinkled and tough. His eyes small and twinkling. And his hair looks as if he had poked it into a bag of Kilkenny cats and had not had time to comb it since."



In over 50 years of traveling circuits in Kentucky, Tennessee, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, Cartwright received 10,000 members into the Methodist Church, personally baptized 12,000, conducted over 500 funerals, and preached more than 15,000 sermons.

Peter Cartwright wrote of the circuit rider's life in his autobiography: "A Methodist preacher, when he felt that God had called him to preach, instead of hunting up a college or Biblical Institute, hunted up a hardy pony, and some traveling apparatus, and with his library always at hand, namely, a Bible, Hymn book, and (Methodist) Discipline, he started, and with a text that never wore out nor grew stale, he cried, "Behold, the Lamb of God, that taketh away the sin of the world." In this way he went through storms of wind, hail, snow, and rain; climbed hills and mountains, traversed valleys, plunged through swamps, swollen streams, lay out all night, wet, weary, and hungry, held his horse by the bridle all night, or tied him to a limb, slept with his saddle blanket for a bed, his saddle-bags for a pillow. Often he slept in dirty cabins, ate roasting ears for bread, drank butter-milk for coffee; took deer or bear meat, or wild turkey, for breakfast, dinner, and supper. This was old-fashioned Methodist preacher fare and fortune."

He was a towering figure of frontier Methodism and one of the most colorful and energetic preachers the church has produced. He called himself "God's Plowman."






